Lake Huron and Canada 150!

Welcome to our July newsletter! July 1 marks **Canada's 150thbirthday** (1867-2017), and all the celebrations have staff at The CoastalCentre reflecting on Lake Huron's history. Lake Huron is an amazing andever changing entity; be that with water levels, maritime history, fish diversity, andbeach usership. We thought that to honour Canada 150, we could share

5historical facts about Lake Huron that you may or may not know:

- 1. When French explorer Samuel de Champlain was exploring Canada in 1603 he conversed with the Algonquin First Nation and they told him of a large lake at the end of the St. Lawrence River. When Champlain reached Lake Huron he thought he had found the Pacific Ocean butinstead found "an ocean of fresh water", and so he called her *La Mer Douce*, "the fresh-water sea". Lake Huron is the **third largest freshwater lake** on EARTH.
- 2. Lake Huron is home to over **1000 ship wrecks**, andfor good reason.

 November 9, 1913 marked "The Big Blow", one of the worststorms to ever hit Lake Huron. This storm caused "ocean-like waves of more than11 metres" and ended up sinking 10 ships and killing 235 seamen across the Great

- Lakes. Lake Huron has some of the best scuba diving areas because of the crystal-clear water and impressively intact wrecks.
- 3. Lake Huron once had more than **250 lighthouses** onits shores, with 130 still in existence today. These lighthouses were extremely important for sailors navigating the intricate and rocky shoreline of Lake Huron and Georgian Bay. Some notable lighthouses include those at Goderich Main (1847); Cove Island (1858); Point Clark (1859); Chantrylsland (1859); Kincardine (1874); Big Tub Tobermory (1885); Cabot Head (1896); Cape Croker (1909); Providence Bay Manitoulin (1973).
- 4. Water levels on Lake Huron are notorious forfluctuating year to year. The highest recorded lake level was the summer of 1986, reaching 1.8 meters above datum; whereas the lowestrecorded level occurred in winter 1964 decreasing to 42 centimeters belowdatum. The **high lake levels** we are experiencing this year are very normal and necessary for coastal health. Looking towards the future, and with the looming impacts of climate change, we should be prepared for these extreme fluctuations more often on Lake Huron.
- 5. As far as Lake Huron's fisheries are concerned, there are a few decades of serious influence. The 1930's were riddled withinvasive species such as sea lamprey causing declines in the Lake Troutpopulations. The 1950's showed us how fragile food webs can bewith the near extirpation of Lake Trout because of the combined impacts of over-fishing and invasive species. Luckily, in 2017 we are finally re-building our Lake Trout populations back to reproduction targets with the help of fishing regulations and fish stocking programs.

For **Canada 150**, we encourage youto get out and experience everything Lake Huron has to offer. Whetherthat is enjoying sunny days on the sand beaches, birding in the coastalwetlands that are teeming with life, or watching a world-class sunset from thedeck at your cottage, we wish you all a safe and happy summer! **We hope to seeyou out at one of our events this summer**!
